Giving thanks in all circumstances....

"Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you."

1 Thessalonions 5:18

In our Wednesday bible study we are reading Paul's first letter to the church in Thessalonica. In the letter he shares his deep gratitude for their faith, work, and hope. He commends them for their labor, prompted by love, that has increased their faith as well as the

endurance they have demonstrated. Paul planted this church in his early missionary journey and expresses his hope and intention to return to them. He indicates that their

sharing in the work of the Gospel as well as their support of him has grafted a deep love in his heart for them. He wants to return so that they can share their mutual thanksgiving in person so that each will be strengthened in faith and love. Sharing with each other the people and circumstances that bring joy into our lives is a common theme in the letters that



that make up so much of the New Testament. Sharing blessings we experience is as important to the formation of a strong family of faith as is the sharing of each other's

burdens. It is a timeless mark of Christians.

On Sunday, November 23rd, the Sunday before Thanksgiving, we will gather for Thanksgiving with our family of faith. This has become a beloved tradition for us and includes several unique elements First, it is our Ingathering Sunday for stewardship. *(continued on p. 2)*

In the January 1985 issue of *For All the Saints*, the Rev. W. Wesley Konrad, then-rector of All Saints, offered this message about stewardship:

Internal Revenue Service notwithstanding, please do not consider your pledge to your church an act of charity. You are not giving to charity when you give to the Church. You are actually saying to God: 'I want to be a part of your action—a substantial part, not a token part.'

You are the Church. When you give to the Church, you give to yourself. You declare by your giving: 'I am thankful for what God has given to me and I want to give a good portion back to be used in His Name for others.'

If you give a token, your blessing will be a token. If you give generously of your substance, you will be blessed generously. It has always been so. It is not different now. 'Cast your bread upon the waters, and it will return to you again' is a fairly accurate description of what happens.' Let's aim for 100% pariticipation of those who think of All Saints as their parish.

As you fill out your pledge card indicating your promise to support All Saints financially, please consider the faithful stewards of 1985 who—having only recently decided to make this a year-round parish—gave more than a token. Let's be as bold and generous in spirit as they were and as resilient and committed as the "saints" who pledged to continue pursuing God's mission for All Saints in the wake of Superstorm Sandy.

What are you doing Wednesday mornings?

Do you enjoy discussing topics related to our faith as Christians? Then, the Bible Study class is for you. At 10:45 a..m., a small group of us gathers each Wednesday for a class led by our Rector. It's structured but informal and freewheeling. Each lesson stands alone. If you have missed a class or never attended, it's not a problem. You can join the group at any time and easily understand what we are discussing.

We begin by taking turns reading a Bible passage and a short passage of text giving background to the reading. A workbook gives a few brief questions to provoke thought and stimulate discussion. And what discussions! We may talk about our reactions to the passage, or what we think it is trying to say. We often talk about incidents from our own lives that illustrate the relevance of those words written so long ago.

This year we completed our study of the Book of Acts. It is a fascinating book, based on the history of the life, missionary journeys, and theology of St. Paul. In the readings during Sunday service, we often hear only the highlight of an incident. In Bible Study, we gain context. At present, we are reading some of Paul's letters. Some are philosophical; some give advice to congregations suffering disputes or descension; all are beautifully written.

If you can fit in an hour of bible study on a Wednesday morning, please join us. I think you'll find it rewarding and enjoyable.


Thanks to all who tickled our ivories!

In late October, Rev. Kathryn joyfully announced during Sunday service that All Saints had received an incredibly generous designated gift toward the purchase of a new concert piano for the sanctuary. The benefactors, who are friends of All Saints, had given us \$50,000 and challenged us to raise the balance of the purchase price of a new professional-grade instrument that would replace our 40-year-old piano that never fully recovered from sitting in 4 feet of floodwater during Superstorm Sandy. The gift, an answer to our prayers, spurred an immediate and generous response from many "saints," enabling us to meet the challenge well before Advent (our original goal).

Thanks to the research and negotiations of Chad Newsome, our co-Junior Warden and choir member, and John Milas, our Minister of Music, All Saints secured a 7.5-foot Yamaha concert grand piano at a deep discount (\$75,500, list priced at \$117,899) from Freehold Music Center. In addition to Chad and John and their committee (Joe DeAmicis, Altha Morton, and Meg Beresik), thanks go to everyone who pitched in to meet the challenge so swiftly, which also enabled us to beat rising costs due to tariffs.

Now we are eagerly awaiting the piano's arrival from Japan. We hope to have it in time for our Messiah concert and sing-along on December 14.
