

The bishop is coming!

Bishop Sally French will make her first Episcopal Visitation to All Saints on the Feast of All Saints observed, Sunday, November 2. She will preach and preside that day when we have one combined service at 10 AM.

We are also planning for adult Confirmation and Reception into the Episcopal Church. This will be an opportunity for us to "pull out all the stops" and share the best of our joyous worship, excellent music programs, a glimpse of our active parish life of mission and ministry and, of course, engaging with this beautiful family of faith.

Following the service there will be an all parish brunch including an opportunity for time with the Bishop. We will share news with her and she will share news with us. Then there will be an opportunity for asking questions. Finally, Bishop French will meet with our Vestry.

There will be lots more information to share and ways to be involved. For now two important things:

Some Musical Notes....

Our own Minister of Music, **John Milas**, is being recognized for his outstanding musicianship and technical skills **at home and abroad**. In August, he took part in a "successful study tour in Portugal."

Through friends in Portugal, John arranged to visit several towns in the north to study historic organs. He noted some significant differences between those organs and the ones elsewhere in the world. Iberian organs, he noted, favor reeds and especially trumpet pipes. They also have only one manual (keyboard) rather than two (likely due to space constraints in old town churches), and that manual is divided down the middle. The pedals and stops on either side of the manual can be used to simulate two manuals.

He even discovered two little-known stops unique to Portuguese organs, which he hopes to document for the *Encyclopedia of Organ Stops*.

On his trip, he was also introduced to the mayor of Satão who explained that the church in his town had recently spent a couple million dollars restoring a "historically significant" organ originally built by the Spanish builder Antonio Silvha (Solha) in the 18th century. Learning of John's musical expertise, the mayor invited him back to play a concert on the organ some time next year.


But that wasn't all the travel and study John undertook this summer. Yamaha Corporation selected him for a one-week course on the West Coast. Not only did he learn some new techniques for piano tuning, he is now Yamaha-certified to work on concert grands.

All Saints Hosts Rising Opera Stars

On September 6, All Saints was honored to host three outstanding young professionals from The Academy of Vocal Arts (Philadelphia) in concert.

Kara Goodrich, soprano, and Luke Norvell, tenor, (in photo above) performed a moving duet from Puccini's La Bohème. The singers also gave us insight into opera. Before presenting "Wie du Warst!" from Der Rosenkavalier by Richard Strauss, Katherine Dobbs, mezzo sopranco, explained that women with lower-register voices like hers have often sung male—or "trouser"—roles in opera. The women also delighted the audience of over 60 attendees with solos from West Side Story, My Fair Lady, and Les Misérables. Accompanying them on the piano was Richard A. Raub.

As Ed Kata noted at the reception that followed, "They were outstanding! You would usually have to go to New York to hear singing of this caliber."

Glorious Duckie Day!

The second annual Duck Derby held on August 9 was a success beyond our imagination! Three hundred-thirty ducks made their way down Scow Ditch as well over 100 duck lovers of all ages gathered across the bridges and along the bulkhead to watch the race. Those selling ducks along with food and wine often had a hard time keeping up with the lines. The garden was filled with families whose children were enjoying games and activities staffed by dozens of volunteers of all ages. It truly was a parish-wide event that drew in a huge crowd from the community. We have definitely found a "niche" with this event.

Many factors helped boost the popularity of the derby within the broader community. This year publicity and signage was more visible and widespread. The weather could not have been more perfect. And the increased number of community groups who meet in our buildings helped to spread the word. Probably the most impactful was that Bay Head Day Camp, the new summer program that met here this summer (see next page), led by Kiah Gluck, were very gracious in distributing information about the event to the families who showed up in droves! Lastly, it probably didn't hurt that a riptide was keeping beach-goers out of the water!

Huge thanks to the nearly 45 volunteers who helped in all phases of preparation, day-of, and clearing-up, as well as in the final washing of ducks, sorting and boxing the massive number of supplies that went into this successful event. 


Connecting with Community: Bay Head Summer Day Camp

All Saints' property was buzzing with energy and joyful children as Bay Head Day Camp launched its inaugural season, under the direction of Kiah Gluck. The program drew children from Bay Head and surrounding towns.

Our beautiful classrooms, garden, and close proximity to the town playgournd provided the perfect setting for nearly two dozen children who attended. It was also a wonderful opportunity to us to expand our welcome and open our doors for increased visibility. Many campers and their families made it a point to take part in our Duck Derby (see p. 4). Our staff also made a "guest appearance" as part of the campers' enrichment activities. John Milas and Kathryn offered a music experience, introducing the children to the king of all instruments, the pipe organ, as well as hand chimes. When John played Happy Birthday on the organ, the children loudly and gleefully sang along, while Kathryn pulled out her guitar and preschool repertoire one rainy day for a jumping good time. And after the Duck Derby, along with their regular water play, the campers helped our crew scrub hundreds of yellow duckies that had run the race. It was Kiah who first approached Kathryn about using our space for the camp. This spurred the formation of a discernment committee to evaluate the proposal, and the vestry ultimately recommended going ahead with the arrangement with an experimental summer. We will be reconvening with Kiah to evaluate the experiment thoroughly, but both the church and the camp were pleased with the experience. The arrangement generated \$6500 in use fees to support the mission and ministry of the parish. We look forward to building on this initial success!
