Pentecost, Confirmation, and Celebration - Please join in making this a grand weekend of celebration and thanksgiving for our parish family.




Saturday, May 18, 11 AM Confirmation at Trinity Cathedral, Trenton.

***Golden Anniversary Concert for our Casavant Pipe Organ -
Friday, May 17, 7:30 p.m.***

Dr. Mark Trautman will lead the All Saints Chamber Orchestra with organ soloist Dr. Michael J. Diorio in works of Bach, Guilmant, Krebs, Lefebvre, Mozart, and Reincken. Included will be the famed and virtuosic *Organ Concerto in d-minor* by J.S. Bach. Our organ was first played by Dr. Lee Hastings Bristol, Jr. on Easter Day 1974, and was formally dedicated that year at the opening of the summer season by the Rt. Rev. Albert W. Van Duzer, the Bishop of the Diocese of New Jersey, on June 30, 1974. The concert will closely mirror the opening concert played by Dr. Bristol with strings and winds in May 1974.

A reception and toast will follow in Bristol Hall, featuring select wines by parishioners Mark and Linda Carduner, owners of Working Dog Winery, Highstown, New Jersey, as well as a fiftieth-anniversary birthday cake!
