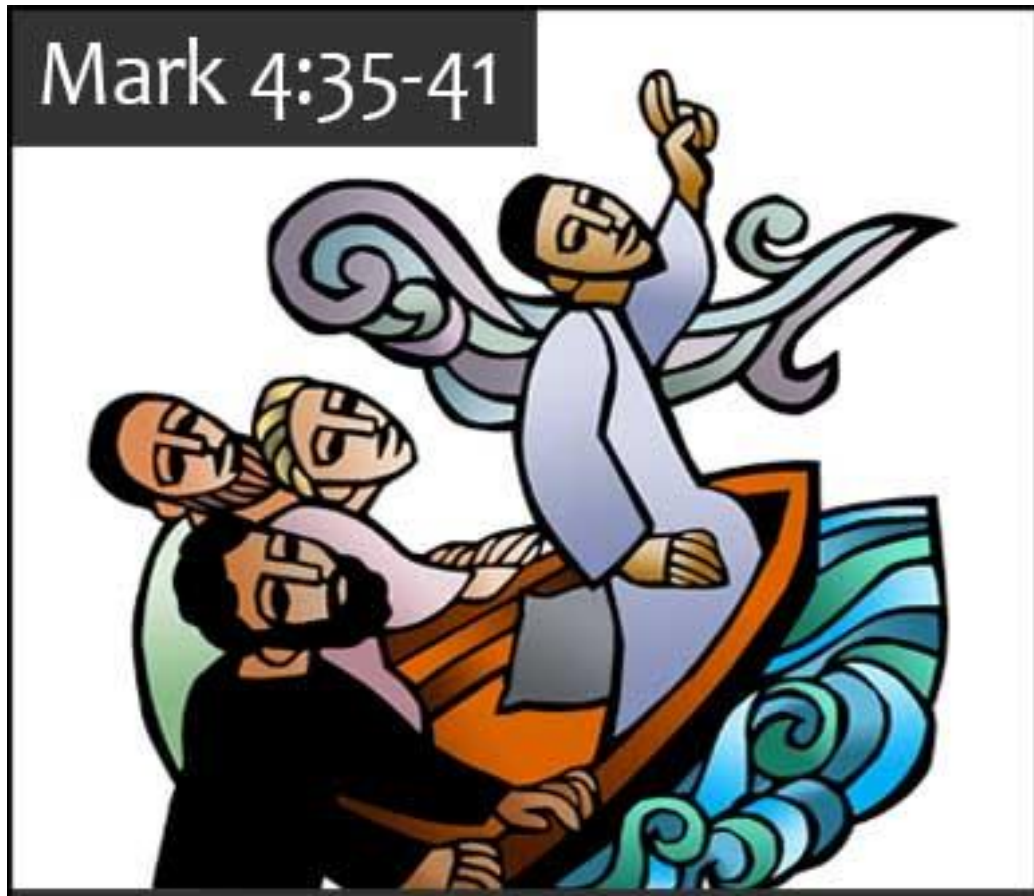

As we work together with Christ, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you."

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see-- we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

We have spoken frankly to you Corinthians; our heart is wide open to you. There is no restriction in our affections, but only in yours. In return-- I speak as to children-- open wide your hearts also.

Presiding bishop election this week

The church is now entering the home stretch of this once-every-nine-years process.

Here's how the election will happen during the 81st General Convention, meeting in Louisville, KY.

On Friday, June 21, the Joint Nominating Committee for the Election of the Presiding Bishop will host a "Meet the Nominees" event from 4-6 p.m. You can watch it live and on-demand here:

On Tuesday, June 25, the JNCPB will formally present the nominees during a joint session of the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies beginning at 10:30 a.m. You can watch it live and on-demand here:

On Wednesday, June 26, following the Convention Eucharist at 8:30 a.m., bishops with seat, voice, and vote will gather at Christ Church Episcopal Cathedral in Louisville for the election. The bishops cast ballots until a presiding bishop is elected. The process is done in executive session. Once there is an election, the current presiding bishop sends a delegation from the House of Bishops to report the result to the president of the House of Deputies, including the number of votes cast for each nominee on each ballot. The House of Deputies must vote to confirm or not to confirm the choice of presiding bishop. You can view the House of Deputies action here: <https://media.episcopalchurch.org/video/>

On June 28, The presiding bishop-elect will be the preacher at the closing General Convention Eucharist on Friday, June 28, at 8:30 a.m. EDT. Presiding Bishop Michael Curry will be the presider.
